# YOUNG ADULT/CHILDREN'S BOOK SALE JUNE 4, 2016

Research from 27 nations has found that children with age appropriate print in the home stand to gain up to three extra years of schooling. The Young Adult/Children's Book Sale on Saturday, June 4, 2016 at Boone County Library provides an opportunity for children (with parental guidance as needed) to shop for age appropriate books for their personal libraries. We have traditionally had a wonderful selection of books from which to select.

Therefore, would you help continue this tradition by contributing gently used children's books (hard and soft cover, fact, fiction, poetry, ect.) to the library? These will be made available to young people (soft cover for \$.10 and hard cover for \$.25). With your assistance, young people will once again have an opportunity to shop and choose from a quality selection of books apporpriate for varying age levels.

Dear Friends of the Library,

We are well on our way into another year -- 2016. We have examined our numbers from 2015 (presented elsewhere in this letter) and concluded our conduct meets minimal standard.

I wish to review with you areas of the 2015 financial report. In comparison with the 2014 report, our total income was down. We received no grants in 2015, while \$5,500 in grants were received in 2014. The income from both the Spring and Fall book sales was about \$500 less than in 2014. All the book sales, except the Children's and the Holiday sales were less. Memberships were down nearly \$300. All totaled, 2015 was down a little over \$2,000.

However, library support was down only about \$600; mainly because of exhaustion of dedicated grant money for purchase of children's books in 2014.

We continued to support the Summer Reading Program, databases, and Honor Books robustly.

We spent less in operations in 2015 than in 2014. In 2014, we advertised in the Harrison Daily Times and participated in Business After Hours sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Almost \$800 was spent on this publicity.

Other stats for the year include 1,825 volunteer hours. A total of 173 volunteers participated in 13 major events. The 1,825 hours translated into \$34,000 according to the Corporation for National and Community Service.

We are circulating over 600 books among 20 ABC and Head Start preschools.

We continue to add a book to the BCL collection to honor everyone who donates over \$25 or donates any amount of labor.

We continue to deliver books to homebound individuals.

We continue to inform with our newsletter, the Bookplate, our website <a href="https://www.folbc.org">www.folbc.org</a>, and Book Ends appearing in the Harrison Daily Times on the last Saturday of the month.

Friends of the Library continues to be a 501(c)3 organization which has a charter to enhance the library.

Every member of this 2016 FOL Board appreciates the opportunity to serve our community in an ethical, frugal, and sagacious way. We wish to garner public trust and your generous support. Thank you for all your help in making a difference.
